Description

Casts, splints and splint-like devices are routinely used to treat certain orthopedic conditions caused from trauma or pathology such as bone fractures, tissue injury, or tears to ligaments and tendons. By providing support to the affected site, casts and splints protect the treated area from additional harm during the healing process and can also decrease pain and swelling. Casting supplies are made from either plaster or fiberglass and are used to immobilize the injury. Casts are custom-made from either plaster or fiberglass and fully encase the treated area staying in place until healing is complete. Splints and splint-like devices can be custom-made from the same materials as casting, however, a variety of prefabricated ("off-the-shelf") splints are available to treat different orthopedic conditions. Splints can be adjusted or removed as needed and are held in place with elastic materials like an ace wrap. (American Academy of Family Physicians, 2009)
